
Polska Variety Pleases

Answer: The 3/4 time signature and the polska-rhythm


Often the 8-bar period is employed


Checkpoints or Skeleton

With schwung, accented 1st and 3rd beat











The 8 bars are now repeated, and it is custom to vary the melody somewhat. Variety pleases, a Swedish saying.











The 'Polska' has meaning, grammar and a cultural worth based on 500 years of tradition. (Or more)





Sharps are notated with # and Flats with b

If one plays a Polska in F-major, one writes F: under the notation, at the beginning.

The F then becomes Do, the G and A Re and Mi.
