From 1968 to 1974 I studied clarinet, piano and singing at the State University for Music in Mannheim. After my state examination, I worked as a music teacher at the Staatliche Realschule and the music school of the Hassloch community. In 1987 I became their director until I retired in 2015. From 1992 to 2020 I was Chief Examiner and responsible for the musically management of the state music youth in Rhineland-Palatinate and the development of qualifications, and author of the Bronze, Silver and Gold course series and worked as a supporter for music teachers and trainers. I conducted several choirs and wind orchestras and founded the Kurpfälzische Palatinate Saxophone Quartet, with which I still give concerts today.
