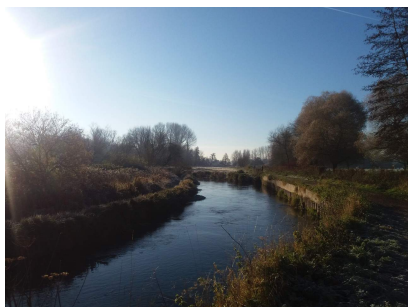
A propos de l'artiste
